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# Annual report: January 1 - December 31, 2003

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# 1. Introduction

Danish National Research Foundation: *Center for Subjectivity Research* was established at the Faculty of Theology, University of Copenhagen on March 1, 2002. The Center is financed by the Danish National Research Foundation with supplementary funding from the University of Copenhagen and Hvidovre Hospital for the period 01.03.2002 – 30.06.2006.

The aim of the Center is to undertake a thorough and comprehensive investigation of what might be considered the three fundamental dimensions of subjectivity: Intentionality, self-awareness, and intersubjectivity (i.e., subjectivity in its relation to the world, to itself, and to others). The research focuses in particular on the question of whether subjectivity can be naturalized. The Center emphasizes interdisciplinary approaches and draws on philosophy of mind, philosophy of religion, and psychopathology and it explicitly seeks to further the dialogue not only between different philosophical traditions (phenomenology, hermeneutics, and analytical philosophy of mind), but also between philosophy and empirical science.

During 2003, the Center organized, co-organized, and/or co-sponsored 10 conferences and workshops (with a total of well over 100 speakers), as well as 28 individual guest lectures by invited speakers. It had 46 foreign visitors, and its staff published 43 books and articles, submitted

28 manuscripts for publication, and presented 90 papers and lectures in Denmark, Finland, Belgium, Switzerland, Germany, France, Italy, Sweden, the USA, Poland, the Czech Republic, Turkey, and Japan. The center continued to expand its national and international collaboration. It has been actively involved in the new research priority area "Body and Mind" at the University of Copenhagen; it has been spearheading a number of research initiatives and funding proposals at a European level; and its interdisciplinary PhD courses have attracted an increasing number of foreign PhD students (from Finland, Norway, Sweden, the UK, Liechtenstein, Belgium, Germany, Italy, Russia, France, Switzerland, and the USA).

2003 proved to be a year characterized by conspicuous growth in more than one way, since the staff of the center was also increased with 9 new PhD students, postdocs, and visiting professors.

Together with a group of philosophers from the Nordic Countries, Dan Zahavi, in 2003, successfully applied to the Joint Committee for Nordic Research Councils for the Humanities and the Social Sciences for funding for a research project entitled "Rearticulations of Reason: Recent Currents". The project received 1,975,000.00 DKK in funding, and is being led by Leila Haaparanta, University of Tampere, Finland. The project will run from 2004-2006. The center's share of the funding will cover one workshop and one 10-month postdoc position. The precise amounts will figure in the center's annual report for 2004 and 2005.

# 4. Research

The research at the Center has followed the guidelines laid down in the Center's research plan, and has been conducted from three different perspectives: 'Philosophy of mind and phenomenology', 'Philosophy of religion and hermeneutics', and 'Psychopathology'.

#### A. Philosophy of mind and phenomenology

Dan Zahavi has worked primarily on the following projects:

1. In recent years, many scientists have claimed that the core symptoms of infantile autism are due to a deficient neuro-cognitive mechanism that underpins the normal ability to develop a "theory of mind". More specifically, infantile autism has been taken to involve not only a lack of a theory of other minds, but also a lack of a theory of one's *own* mind. Zahavi argues that much of this discussion is characterized by conceptual confusion, and by the lack of a sound theory of both intersubjectivity and self-awareness [cf. research plan sections A.III and A.VII].

2. Recent empirical evidence suggests that even newborns can pick up the intermodal invariants that specify self- versus nonself-stimulation. This has made some developmental psychologists argue that infants are not only in possession of proprioceptive information about their own bodies from birth, but that they are also in possession of an early perceptually-based sense of themselves. Zahavi argues that bodily self-experience is of crucial importance for the development of both intersubjectivity and selfhood, but that many developmental psychologists have erroneously conceived of the embodied self as an object, and of embodied self-awareness as a kind of object-awareness [cf. research plan sections A.VI and A.VII].

3. Husserl's so-called *Bernauer Manuskripte über das Zeitbewusstsein* were published in 2001. The manuscripts contain a number of reflections and analyses of the structure of timeconsciousness and the nature of self-consciousness. Analysing the manuscripts in detail, Zahavi argues that Husserl sketched out three rather different accounts that all remain rather problematic [cf. research plan sections A.III and B.V].

4. Is the phenomenological conception of intentionality committed to either internalism or externalism? Dreyfus and McIntyre have argued that a noematic account of intentionality constitutes a kind of arch-internalism. Zahavi criticizes this interpretation and shows that it rests on a questionable Fregean reading of the noema. Not only is it possible to interpret the noema differently, namely in a manner that makes the concept far more congenial to certain types of externalism, but ultimately, Zahavi argues that the phenomenological analysis of intentionality entails such a fundamental rethinking of the very relation between subjectivity and world that it hardly makes sense to designate it as being either internalist or externalist [cf. research plan sections A.IV and A.V].

5. Is it possible to investigate subjectivity reflectively? Can reflection give us access to the original experiential dimension, or is there, on the contrary, reason to suspect that the experiences are changed radically when reflected upon? This is a question that Natorp discussed in his *Allgemeine Psychologie* (1912), and the conclusion he reached was highly anti-phenomenological, and was subsequently criticized by Heidegger in a number of his early Freiburg lectures. Zahavi analyzes Heidegger's early views on reflection, selfhood, and pre-reflective self-awareness, and discusses the relationship between reflective phenomenology and hermeneutical phenomenology [cf. research plan sections A.I and A.III].

*Galen Strawson* (University of Reading, UK), who was attached to the Center as visiting professor in the period September 1 – December 15, has primarily worked on the following projects: 1. An investigation of the metaphysical nature of self and consciousness. Strawson, in particular, investigates whether the best thing to say about the self, in the human case, is that it is a short lived entity, lasting up to three seconds at most; so that the life of a normal human being involves many selves.

2. An analysis of the temporal aspects of the phenomenology of the self and their ethical implications. This work is related to the question as to whether human beings experience their lives as narratives or stories of some sort, and whether such experience is a necessary condition of a good life.

3. Finally, Strawson has worked on the notion of intentionality.

*Rudolf Bernet* (Katholieke Universiteit Leuven, Belgium), who was attached to the Center as visiting professor in the period December 1 – December 15, worked on the following projects during his stay:

1. An article relating Heidegger's account of a "concealment" constitutive of truth to Poe's short story "La lettre volée" in order to show how philosophical reflections can be exemplified and clarified by means of literary texts.

2. An analysis of Bergson's concept of "le passé pur" in Matière et mémoire.

The dissertation project of *Lisa Käll* – "The Emergence of Singular Selfhood in and through the Paradox of Expression" – aims at providing a better understanding of selfhood, no longer defined dichotomously. The project is mainly concerned with Merleau-Ponty's philosophy of expression and connects phenomenological philosophies of the expressive body with theories of linguistic expression. The work on the project this year mainly focuses on the study of phenomenology. This study partly took place at the Institute of Philosophy at Katholieke Universiteit Leuven, Belgium, where Lisa Käll spent the spring of 2003 studying with Professor Rudolf Bernet. During the fall of 2003, the research has been concerned with connecting the issue of expression to that of narration and narrativity, as well as exploring the possible relations between break-downs of expression and self-disturbances in schizophrenia described in the writings of Antonin Artaud.

The dissertation project of *Thor Grünbaum* – "A phenomenological description of the experience of action" – seeks to clarify the structure of the consciousness in action. The focus is primarily on the experience of the body in action. The project starts out with a description of the relation between the experience of will (intention, volition) and bodily movement in order to confront the problem of how the experience of agency and causality are related. This serves as a basis for an analysis of the structural relations between intention, bodily movements, and perception in the experience of action.

*Søren Overgaard's* work, under the project title "The Situated Subject", primarily focuses on two questions: 1. The question concerning the tasks and method of philosophy, with special focus on phenomenology and Wittgensteinian analytic philosophy. 2. The question concerning the nature of subjectivity, again with special attention to phenomenological and Wittgensteinian approaches. The hypothesis is that, although in very different ways, the various phenomenological accounts as well as the Wittgensteinian account ultimately present us with a subject that cannot *be* a subject except by being "situated" and "exposed". An investigation of these two types of approaches thus paves the way for a radical re-interpretation of what it means to be a subjectivity.

#### B. Philosophy of religion and hermeneutics

Arne Grøn has worked primarily on the following projects:

The foundation and status of philosophy of religion: In continuation of research done in 2002, the clarification of this issue, which is of fundamental importance for the second part of the research program [cf. research plan B. Introduction and section B.III], focuses on the relation between the notion of limit situations and the notion of the human condition [cf. research plan section B.VII]. Further work on this theme will involve the third part of the research plan [cf. section C.I].
 The potential of philosophy of religion (as developed in 1) for a theory of subjectivity: Within this project, the analyses focus on two related issues: a) Subjectivity and transcendence. Transcendence is a key notion in philosophical approaches to religion, but it is also a crucial issue

in philosophical analyses of the interrelation of the dimensions of subjectivity: relation to the world, to others, and to oneself. The aim is to give a critical re-interpretation of the notion of transcendence in order to further clarify this interrelation as a complex core feature of subjectivity [cf. research plan sections A.VII and B.III]. b) Subjectivity, imagination, and interpretation. Philosophical approaches to religion have stressed that religion is a matter of imagination and interpretation. As obvious as the subjectivity involved in imagination and interpretation seems to be, as complex are the features of subjectivity, which here come to the fore. The aim is in particular to clarify the self-relation involved in imagination and interpretation [cf. research plan sections B.I and B.IV]. Articles have been written on both issues.

3. Within the overall project of delineating a hermeneutical theory of subjectivity, Grøn has written articles on the following issues: a) The notion and the problem of subjectivity. This article seeks to reformulate the problem of subjectivity in terms of self-understanding in response to criticism of philosophies of subjectivity. b) The problem of personal identity in terms of self and identity. This article develops a hermeneutical approach to the problem of self-identity in discussing approaches in philosophy of mind [cf. the research plan sections A. Introduction and B.IV]. c) Narrativity, historicity and subjectivity. This article (which has not yet been submitted) argues that a theory of narrative identity cannot fully account for the subjectivity involved if narratives are taken to be decisive in the history of humans. d) Subjectivity and truth. This article seeks to reformulate the existential dimension of truth in a discussion of Kierkegaard. All four parts aim at further clarifying the key notion of self as self-relation [cf. the research plan B.IV].

4. Normative dimensions of subjectivity: Within this framework, the analyses have focused on the following issues: a) Normativity and pathology [cf. the research plan B.VI and C.I]. b) Temporality and normativity, especially the relation between temporality, relation to others ,and self-relation in phenomena such as resentment, repentance, forgiveness, and reconciliation [cf. the research plan B.V and B.VI]. c) Ethics and limit situations [cf. the research plan B.VI and B.VI].

The dissertation project of *Iben Damgaard* – "Passion of possibility. Subjectivity and possibility from the perspective of hermeneutics and philosophy of religion" – seeks to illuminate the both fundamental and ambiguous role of possibility in human self-relation and relation to God, the world, and other persons. This will be explored thematically by focusing on phenomena such as imagination, anxiety, despair, guilt, sin, forgiveness, faith, hope, and love and the question of the temporal and ethical aspects of the self. The project primarily draws on the philosophy of Kierkegaard and Ricoeur. In the fall of 2003, Iben Damgaard did 3 months of PhD research with Professor Jean Greisch at the Institut Catholique in Paris.

The dissertation project of *Birgitte Kvist Poulsen* – "Modernity and trinity in G. W. F. Hegel's Geiststructure" – seeks to clarify the relation between subjectivity and Christianity in the light of Hegel's Geist-structure. Using the Geist-structure as a prism, the idea is to illuminate this relation, but in such a way that the trinity's relations provide the background for the understanding of the subject's relation to God, itself, and the world. Thus, the Geist-structure is seen both as the key to understanding the concept of God, and as the key to understanding the position of human subjectivity. The dissertation was submitted in December 2003 and Birgitte Kvist Poulsen will be defending her thesis in March 2004.

The dissertation project of *Wenche Marit Quist* – "Human Being in Time. An Analysis of the Temporality of Existence with continual Reference to Søren Kierkegaard and Martin Heidegger" – is focused on the concept of time in the works of Søren Kierkegaard and Martin Heidegger. Through an analysis of how time must be understood as both a structure for the human existence and as an experience of being human, the concept of time is characterized and thereby seen in the light of basic life phenomena, i.e., guilt, conscience, hope, forgiveness, relation to death, understandings of possibilities in life, anxiety, and boredom.

The project of *Cornelia Richter* – "Subject and subjectivity in Kant. The story of the ambivalence and misunderstanding of a basic idea" – seeks to examine different notions of the subject (autonomous and self-sufficient vs. contingent and relative), to discuss different interpretations of Kant (focusing on the first two critiques as opposed to the later writings such as "Kritik der Urteilskraft" and "Religion innerhalb der Grenzen der reinen Vernunft"), and to analyze the lines of his interpretation in the phenomenological tradition (e.g. Husserl and Merleau-Ponty), as well as in the neo-Kantian tradition (Cohen and Natorp).

#### C. Psychopathology

Josef Parnas has worked primarily on the following projects:

1. The major effort was devoted to the issue of anomalies of subjective experience in schizophrenia, and more specifically to three interrelated issues: first, to develop a phenomenologically adequate understanding of the notion of experiential self-anomaly; second, to assess the diagnostic specificity of such disorders to the schizophrenia spectrum of disorders; and third, to develop a more sophisticated psychometric instrument for future studies [cf. the research plan C.I].

2. We have analysed in detail the initial data from a prospective study of 155 admission cases (of which, 100 suffered from schizophrenia or schizotypy). Anomalies of self-awareness, such as unstable first person perspective, feelings of inner void, and hyper-reflexivity accurately distinguished patients with a schizophrenia spectrum disorder from other patients. Moreover, in poly-diagnostic analyses of the same sample, we found reason to believe that self-disorders constitute a crucial component of the construct validity of the schizophrenia spectrum concept—a finding, which, if it is replicated in another sample, would bear on the diagnostic criteria of schizophrenia [cf. the research plan C.II, C.III].

3. On the basis of classic literature studies, our own and other empirical projects and clinical experience, we have further developed a psychometric scale for qualitative description and intensity-frequency scoring of anomalies in self-awareness (EASE; Examination of Anomalous Self-Experience). This very time consuming work consisted of different data collection from recently admitted patients, conceptual analyses of the accumulated item-pool, re-testing of the items in clinical samples with respect to the content validity, and finally testing of inter-rater reliability of the EASE. This work required interdisciplinary sessions with Zahavi—concerning phenomenological consistency of the items [cf. the research plan C.II, C.III].

4. As a natural continuation we have been preparing a new study of first admission cases, to be examined with the EASE, a study that also will include a control group of patients with focal damage to the frontal lobes. This design is motivated by two current assumptions in cognitive science: that schizophrenia is associated with a dysfunction of frontal lobes, and that several regions of the prefrontal cortex constitute a neural basis for self-representation.

5. Concerning the last point of our programme, metaphysical assumptions in psychiatry, we have produced (as an invited chapter to a World Psychiatric Association official monograph on Personality Disorders) a systematic review, written mainly from a critical phenomenological perspective, concerning the most important conceptual aspects of contemporary causal research in psychiatry [cf. the research plan C.V].

Pierre Bovet (Université de Lausanne, Schweiz) was affiliated with the Center as a Visiting Professor from April 1 – June 30, and worked primarily on the following projects:
1. The psychopathology of the schizophrenia spectrum of disorders.
2. Cluster A personality disorders (the history of the concept of schizoidia, as well as the

psychopathological dimensions and clinical manifestations of the disorders).

The focus of *Deborah Licht's* work has been on organizing and analyzing data from a pedigree study on schizophrenia. The overall goal of analyzing and interpreting the data is to explore the schizophrenia spectrum, in order to determine if there is an underlying taxonomic structure in the

type of data that has been collected. In particular, one hypothesis to be tested is whether family members with diagnoses within the schizophrenia spectrum exhibit more global thought disorder, more severe thinking disturbances, or a more schizophrenic type of thinking disturbance than members outside the spectrum (family members with other mental illnesses and family members with no mental illness).

The dissertation project of *Jørgen Thalbitzer* – "Schizophrenia, Self-disturbances and brain misconnectivity" – is in collaboration with Hvidovre Hospital. The aim of the project is to register disturbances of the self in a group of first admitted schizophrenia spectrum patients and a group of other psychiatric patients through a semi-structured interview and compare these findings. The aim of identifying the type and severity of self-disturbances in the schizophrenia spectrum group is to use this knowledge to improve the possibilities of early identification and intervention of persons at risk of developing schizophrenia.

The dissertation project of *Anne Vollmer-Larsen* – "Factors in illness development: A follow-up study of first admission patients and previously identified high risk community samples" – aims at identifying the prodromal symptoms that have a predictive value in foreseeing schizophrenia. The hypothesis is that prodromal symptoms such as changes in perception and self-experience are of special importance. The investigation will include a non-psychotic patient population and a non-clinical population with genetic risk of schizophrenia. The hope is that the investigation will improve clinical possibilities of identifying persons at risk for developing schizophrenia and make early prevention possible.
